

July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018 Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee



The Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee is pleased to present its annual report on the progress of the San Rafael City Schools' (District) Bond Measures A and B initiatives for the 2017-18 fiscal year.

In 2017-18, the District completed three important projects. At Bahia Vista Elementary School, the construction and installation of a lunch/shade structure was completed in time for the spring. HVAC Systems were installed at San Rafael High School and Terra Linda High School, both completed under budget. In conjunction with finalizing these projects, many more design and construction efforts began. By April 2018, the San Rafael High School Stadium was under construction and nearing completion with the final installation of the turf field. Construction of a new Multi-Purpose Room at Glenwood Elementary School began, along with the modernization of the Davidson Annex, designed to temporarily house students and staff in preparation for construction at Laurel Dell Elementary School. In addition, design efforts began on a number of major projects including the San Rafael High School Madrone, Administration, Commons, Kitchen ("MACK") Project; the Terra Linda High School Innovations Hub Project; the Terra Linda High School Commons, Kitchen, Library, Drama Project; the Laurel Dell Campus Replacement Project; the Davidson STEAM Classroom Project; the Venetia Valley K-8 Replacement Classroom Project; and, the San Pedro New Classroom/Administration Project.

It is important to note that in 2017-18, the construction landscape in Marin County and the entire region grew, and in turn, faced and continues to face significant challenges. Beginning in late 2016, numerous public agencies were successful in getting voters to support added bond measures, which required the work of an already stretched pool of contractors and consultants. Additionally, in 2017, the region was struck with the Tubbs fire, which required immediate resources to begin rebuilding the more than 5,600 structures that were destroyed. As a result, the pool of available and qualified contractors was and is being rapidly exhausted. In turn, construction pricing continues to escalate.

The Capital Improvements Division continued to work diligently and proactively to make sure that the projects are realized, ensuring the highest standard of quality within all of the Measure A and B Bond programs, while keeping with the outlined use of bond revenues. Communication with school families, neighbors, and surrounding communities will continue to be at the forefront of program efforts as we look forward to the successful completion of these exciting projects.

In terms of looking ahead to the 2018-19 school year, San Rafael City Schools had unprecedented levels of construction activity. A very wet weather year challenged our construction progress and construction crews did all they could do to mitigate delays caused by the weather. Despite the weather, significant progress continued throughout the District. For example, a new Multi-purpose Room at Glenwood Elementary School was completed and celebrated at an opening ceremony in June 2019

Background

BACKGROUND

In 2015, the voters of the San Rafael City Schools' District passed Measure A and Measure B. Measure A is a \$108,225,000 bond measure and Measure B is a \$160,500,000 bond measure that authorize funding for needed repairs, upgrades, and new construction projects to the District's elementary and high schools, respectively. Proposition 39 requires a 55% supermajority for approval; Measure A passed by 66% and Measure B passed by 67%.

BOND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

Under the provisions of the California Constitution as amended by Prop 39 an independent Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (CBOC) must be established to assure that Bond funds are spent as approved by the voters.

On January 11, 2016 the San Rafael City Schools' Board of Education approved Resolution 1668 establishing a Bond Oversight committee for the elementary and high school district bond funds.

The purpose of the CBOC is to inform the public concerning the expenditures and uses of bond revenues. The CBOC shall actively review and report on the expenditure of taxpayers' money for bond-funded construction. The CBOC duties are:

 Inform the Public. The Committee shall inform the public concerning the District's expenditure of bond proceeds. In fulfilling this duty, all official communications to either the Board or the public

- shall come from the Chair acting on behalf of the Committee. The Chair shall only release information that reflects the majority view of the Committee.
- Review Expenditures. The Committee shall review expenditure reports produced by the District to
 - ensure that (a) bond proceeds were expended only for the purposes set forth in Measure A and Measure B, respectively; and (b) no bond proceeds were used for teacher or administrative salaries or other operating expenses in compliance with Attorney General Opinion 04-110, issued on November 9, 2004.
- Annual Report. The Committee shall present to the Board, in public session, following each fiscal year, an annual written report for each of the Measures which shall include the following:
 - ✓ A statement indicating whether the District is in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution; and
 - ✓ A summary of the Committee's proceedings and activities for the preceding year.





CBOC Activities

The Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee ("Committee") is responsible for meeting at least once per year, but must not meet more frequently than quarterly. All meetings shall be held within the boundaries of the San Rafael City Schools, located in Marin County, California. All meetings must be open to the public in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act, Government Code Section 54950 et seq and the number of Committee members must constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business of the Committee.

There were four (4) CBOC Meetings held during fiscal year 2017-18.

Audit Review and Findings

FISCAL AND PERFORMANCE AUDIT

As required by Measure A and B Bond language, each year a fiscal and performance audit of Measure A and B expenditures is conducted.

The certified public accountant firm of Nigro & Nigro performed the required 2017-18 financial and performance audits for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018. The auditor issued an unqualified opinion that no deficiencies or unallowable expenses were discovered.

The audit reports were presented and approved by the District's Board of Education at their meeting held on December 17, 2018. With this, it was concluded that San Rafael City Schools complied in all material respects with Measures A and B requirements to expend bond proceeds only on the school facilities projects specified in each. The audit was received by the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee at the March 4, 2019 CBOC Meeting.
